

'DOCTOR GOOGLE'

More than half of Canadians use 'Doctor Google' to self-diagnose

Health-care professionals have come to expect that the majority of the patients they see will have done some online research into what might be happening with their bodies

Virtual health care was adopted more widely during the COVID-19 pandemic, with many people accessing health-care providers remotely.

However, easy and convenient access to technology means some people may choose to bypass health care and consult Dr. Google directly, with online self-diagnosis.

On the other hand - those using Dr. Google will also have more questions and are more interested in learning more from their own family doctor.

THE PROS AND CONS OF "DR. GOOGLE"

For Patients

Dr. Google can be both a positive and a negative. Patients are able to do some research before going in to their provider. They are able to work through their symptoms and understand some of the medical jargon. Because of this, they feel more comfortable when heading in to see their provider because they feel equipped to correctly and accurately communicate what they're feeling.

A negative to consulting Dr. Google is that most people don't go past the first page of search results, and there's no telling what is going to show up. It can range from an article from the CDC to a WebMD synopsis, to an opinion piece, or someone giving an anecdote about how they cured whatever symptoms they were dealing with on their own. Results run from helpful to dangerous. So, if you are a patient reading this, be sure to check your sources and make sure you are getting quality information. Diagnosing and treating yourself can cause things to escalate quickly, so be sure to check in with your doctor before giving yourself a month to live or taking a strange concoction made from stuff in your medicine cabinet or refrigerator.

For Providers

72% of internet users have reported searching for healthcare information online, 48% of people will go online before even consulting their healthcare provider. Needless to say, Dr. Google is here to stay. Many providers have begun to embrace this shift, though sometimes it may be difficult. Sometimes a patient comes in with a diagnosis already in their mind, based on what they've read. It's important to listen to what they have to say and validate their concerns and make them feel heard.

The patient-provider relationship is impacted the most based on a provider's response to their patients' knowledge as they come into the office. If a provider responds by completely dismissing the information their patients bring to the table, it can negatively affect the relationship and the trust that is necessary between patient and provider.

PROVINCIAL ATTACHMENT SYSTEM DEADLINE - ADDITIONAL TIME TO JANUARY 31

In order to receive the \$6,500 payment, doctors now have until January 31 to submit their patient panels and access the Provincial Attachment System's Panel Registry. This applies to physicians being paid under all payment models, including LFP Payment Model, Fee-for-Service, Blended Capitation, and AP models.

Things to do:

- Log in to the <u>Panel Registry</u>, identify if you can take on new patients and provide or update/correct other clinic information.
- Review the <u>PAS payments page</u> that includes a detailed FAQ to ensure you have covered all the actions required in order to receive the \$6,500 payment.



Gynecologic Fees

The fee for IUD insertion has been increased significantly, in recognition of the business costs and time required to provide trauma-informed IUD insertions. This fee is now equitable with 14542 Insertion of subdermal contraceptive implant.

In addition, a new gynecologic cervical block fee has been created to better enable the use of local anesthetic/cervical blocks for IUD insertions, in alignment with SOGC recommendations. The cervical block fee can also be billed for complex IUD removals (e.g. stringless IUDs), endometrial biopsies, cervical biopsies, and cervical polypectomies as is clinically required.

14540 Insertion of intrauterine contraceptive device (operation only) - \$55.22 (\$46.79) Note: Includes Pap smear, if required.

14563 Gynecologic Cervical Block - extra - \$25.00

Vasectomy Fee

The fee value of the FP vasectomy bonus has also been substantially increased as well as the number of bonuses payable per year.

13655 FP Vasectomy bonus associated with bilateral vasectomy - extra - \$45.00 (\$23.56)

Notes:

- i) Restricted to Family Physicians.
- ii) Maximum of 25 50 bonuses per calendar year per physician.
- iii) Payable only in addition to fee item 08345.
- iv) Maximum of one bonus per vasectomy per procedure.

Respiratory Immunization FEE

98101 LFP Respiratory Immunization Provided by an Allied Care Provider.......\$14

- a) Payable only to physicians who have billed 98000 Registration Code and locum physicians who have billed 98005 Locum Registration Code.
- b) Payable for influenza (using ICD-9 code V048), pneumococcal (using ICD 9 code V05), pertussis (using ICD-9 code V036), and COVID-19 (using ICD-9 code C19) immunizations.
- c) Payable only when the immunization is provided by an Allied Care Provider who is employed by a physician practice. The Allied Care Provider must be paid out of practice earnings to work directly within the practice team with no cost recovery either directly or indirectly from a third party (e.g. Health Authority, Division of Family Practice, Ministry of Health).
- d) Payable for a maximum of three immunizations per patient per day
- e) Payable only for immunizations provided from October 1, 2023 to March 31, 2024.
- f) This code is not subject to the daily maximum of 50 Patient Interaction Codes and Locum Patient Interaction Codes.
- g) This code is not subject to the 30% limit on Non-Panel Services



ICBC SPECIALIZED PHYSICIAN SERVICES REPORT

Any physician providing a consultation to a patient involved in a motor vehicle accident can fill out the Specialized Physician Services Report A94573. In order to provide a consultation, you require a written referral from a physician.

The intent of the Specialized Physician Services Report is to provide assistance in maximizing recovery and progress towards functional restoration for patients who have an active claim under ICBC's new Enhanced Care Insurance System.

Physician Specialized Services Report (CL489S) Includes Specialists and family physicians with focus on Sports Medicine. Only for patients whose accident

occurred on May 1,

2021 or later.

Report only

\$275 (Code A94573) family physician completes either an FP Standard or FP Extended Medical Report after the initial assessment, not both. A report is required for each new claim.

2023 CLFP Payment Timelines

- December 31, 2023: Deadline for cleaning up & submitting your patient panel and confirming practice information as part of the Provincial Attachment System Panel Registry.
- January 18, 2024: Deadline for submitting the CLFP Payment web claim form.
 - March 2024: Payments will be made to eligible physicians.

COVID VACCINES

Many physicians now have the opportunity, for the first time, to offer COVID-19 vaccinations in their own clinics during this respiratory illness season.

If you are a physician who is interested in providing the vaccines to your patient community, please contact the Medical Health Officer in your health authority. The MHO can provide more details about how to order both the influenza and COVID-19 vaccines, and/or assist you with ordering influenza and COVID-19 vaccines.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)

RSV causes infections of the lungs and respiratory tract. It's so common that most children have been infected with the virus by age 2. Respiratory syncytial (sin-SISH-ul) virus can also infect adults.

In adults and older, healthy children, respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) symptoms are mild and typically mimic the common cold. Self-care measures are usually all that's needed to relieve any discomfort.

RSV can cause severe infection in some people, including babies 12 months and younger (infants), especially premature infants, older adults, people with heart and lung disease, or anyone with a weak immune system (immunocompromised).

January is Alzheimer Awareness month

Alzheimer's is a type of dementia that affects memory, thinking and behavior. Symptoms eventually grow severe enough to interfere with daily tasks.

Annually, there are approximately 76,000 new cases of dementia diagnosed in Canada. This represents an incidence of 14.3 new cases per 1,000 in the senior population (65 years and older). The incidence is higher among women than men.

February is Concussion Awareness Month

A concussion is a type of traumatic brain injury, or TBI, caused by a bump, blow, or jolt to the head or by a hit to the body that causes the head and brain to move rapidly back and forth. Rapid movement causes brain tissue to change shape, which can stretch and damage brain cells. This damage also causes chemical and metabolic changes within the brain cells, making it more difficult for cells to function and communicate.

Post-Concussion Syndrome, or PCS, is the persistence of concussion symptoms beyond the normal course of recovery. The majority of concussion symptoms will resolve within about two weeks. In cases where symptoms last longer than one or two months, doctors may diagnose Post-Concussion Syndrome.









March is Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month

Inherited bleeding disorders are a family of diseases in which blood proteins or platelets that help the blood to clot are missing or do not function properly, resulting in prolonged bleeding. These conditions include hemophilia A and B, von Willebrand disease, rare factor deficiencies and platelet function disorders

About 300,000 Canadians carry an inherited bleeding disorder gene. One in ten of these people—at least 30,000 Canadians—have symptoms severe enough to require medical care. Many of them have not been properly diagnosed. Only 10,000 people with inherited bleeding disorders are registered in the Canadian network of inherited bleeding disorder comprehensive care clinics.




