

WELCOME



The 2015-16 was truly the year of **Member Engagement** and **Partner Collaboration** for the Powell River Division of Family Practice. With over 15 projects and initiatives on the go, membership engagement was critical to ensure meaningful impact on the primary healthcare system – and collaboration with our partners made that impact even more substantial.

Member Engagement has been instrumental in the success of our organization and the division of family practice movement. The Provincial *A GP for Me* initiative and the local palliative care project provided us with opportunities to meaningfully engage our members and give them a voice in influencing primary care improvements. Our A GP for Me work began in earnest: the number of unatttached patients dropped from 25% to 12% of our population; we supported clinics and incoming GPs in recruiting 5 new doctors to the community; and we developed a website for patients to access health resources in our community. The palliative care project improved the discharge process from acute care to home, increased community awareness and provided meaningful training for healthcare professionals. The insights, commitment and expertise of our members have positively shaped our outcomes and made a meaningful difference in all of our projects and initiatives.

Partner Collaboration has been another key theme in 2015-16. Our partnership with the City of Powell River to leverage the Resident Attraction campaign for

physician recruitment is an example how we are "better together". Equally, our close partnership with Vancouver Coastal Health and the Hospice Society to improve palliative care demonstrates the power of collaboration. Working with other organizations is challenging and rewarding. We will continue to invest in building relationships in order to reap the benefits.

As outlined by Deputy Minister Stephen Brown, in March 2015, the new vision for our Health Care System is for British Columbians to have an easily understood, recognizable, coordinated system of care in their communities, based on the foundation of the patient medical home, supported by integrated primary and community care services, and both health authority and community agency services.

Our members have had a unique opportunity to work collaboratively with our health authority and community partners. The result is a system of primary care in Powell River that addresses the triple aim of improved patient and provider experience of care, improved population health, and more efficient use of financial resources.

In closing, we wish to acknowledge the dedication of our board, members, and project team, who are making a meaningful difference every day in the health and wellbeing of Powell River residents.

The General Practice Services Committee (GPSC) is a joint committee formed under the 2002 Physician Master Agreement between Doctors of BC and the provincial government. Its purpose is to support family and general practice physicians by developing and implementing programs that improve health care for patients, job satisfaction for physicians and help sustain the BC health care system.

Divisions of Family Practice are community-based groups of primarily family physicians working together to achieve common health care goals.

The Divisions initiative provides members with a stronger collective voice in their community while supporting them to improve their clinical practices, offer comprehensive patient services, and engage with their local health authority to enhance their ability to deliver care.

There are currently 35 Divisions of Family Practice in BC that encompass 230 communities.


GOOD FOR MEMBERS

In 2015-16, we took the opportunity to build and deepen relationships with key community partners such as the City of Powell **River, the Powell River Regional** District and Vancouver Coastal Health. Our collaborative efforts focused on physician recruitment, health promotion, and the local economy.

PHYSICIAN RECRUITMENT AND **RETENTION COLLABORATION**

Access to primary care is very important to Powell River residents. As part of A GP for Me initiative, we partnered with the City of Powell River to build on the Resident Attraction campaign so we could better market our community to healthcare professionals. The collaboration resulted in the development of 3 videos and 1 brochure focusing on physician recruitment. We also supported all our clinics to develop marketing materials to better advertise themselves to new physicians. physicians.

HEALTH PROMOTION COLLABORATION

A community approach to health is critical to ensuring that we can have a more meaningful impact. This year, we were involved in many exciting health promotion projects such as active transportation, enhancing sexual health education, and care provision. In addition, we have contributed to the PR Wellness Initiative and the Healthy City Committee.

LOCAL ECONOMY COLLABORATION

A strong local economy helps support a healthy population. Therefore, we make a conscious effort to spend locally in order to support small businesses. Since 2010, we have invested \$1.9m in our local economy and have contributed to providing meaningful employment opportunities in our community.







THE IMPACT:

IN-PATIENT CARE

THE IMPACT:

- 100% of members involved in two networks
- 100% of unassigned patients were admitted and discharged by a local physician
- \$80,300 in incentives were distributed to the two networks

ACCESS TO CARE

THE IMPACT:

- Improved access to care by decreasing the number of unattached patients from 25% to 12% of our population
- Improved access by relocating an NP in a GP office (36 % increased panel size of Nurse Practitioner)

PATIENT-CENTRED FAMILY PRACTICE

A longitudinal patient/primary care provider relationship supports patient care across the continuum of care. This relationship is recognized for improving population health, the patient experience and reducing pressure on the overall healthcare system.

IMPROVING PALLIATIVE CARE Physician Lead: Dr. David May

THE SCOPE:

In October 2014, the Powell River Division of Family Practice received funding to work in partnership with Vancouver Coastal Health to improve palliative care in our community. Phase 1 of the project, which closed March 31, 2015, focussed on:

1. Improving coordination and communication between healthcare providers – in particular between Acute Care, Home and Community Care and GPs

2. Improving stakeholder awareness and understanding of palliative care

3. Improving patients' and caregivers' experience

On April 1st, 2016, the project received approval for phase 2 of the project.

THE IMPACT:

- Increased GP awareness about the Palliative Performance Scale (PPS) increased from 79% in 2015 to 100% in 2016 and their use to 91%
- On average 45 healthcare
 providers attended the 3 End of
 Life training sessions; on average
 15 RNs attended the 3 palliative
 care 101 workshops
- 95% of healthcare providers are more comfortable talking to patients and their families about end of life plans
- 161 people attended a film and 100 people participated in a panel discussion afterwards:
 93% was more comfortable discussing end of life care with their physician afterwards

COMMUNITY HEALTH

By partnering with local organizations, we strive to enable residents of our community to increase control over, and to improve, their health. Projects and initiatives move beyond a focus on individual behaviour towards a wide range of social and environmental interventions such as education and civic infrastructure.



PR WELLNESS INITIATIVE

THE SCOPE:

PR Wellness engages community partners in a combination of health and wellness events and initiatives to encourage more residents in the Powell River Region to improve their health.

THE IMPACT:

- 975 participants at the PR Wellness Challenge
- over 200 participants at the PR Wellness Speaker Forum
- \$700 in donation to the Youth Wellness Girls Mountain Biking initiative

ENHANCING SEXUAL HEALTH EDUCATION AND CARE PROVISION (ESHEC)

Physician Lead:

Dr. Leta Burechailo

THE SCOPE:

ESHEC seeks to improve access to sexual health education for all by increasing capacity, confidence, and competence for teachers, child and youth support professionals, and healthcare providers.

THE IMPACT:

- 25 sessions delivered to 5 different groups
- 536 participants involved
- 1 community roadmap developed

ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION Physician Lead: Dr. Chris Morwood THE SCOPE:

The Active Transportation project aims to meaningfully engage youth in cycling as a means of active transportation.

THE IMPACT:

- 21 sessions delivered
- 181 students participated
- 6 bike racks designed by elementary students involved in the project
- 100+ attended the Bike Night event

COMMUNITY RESOURCES (FETCH)

THE SCOPE:

Fetch (for Everything that is Community Health) website was developed with the intention to improve access to community resources for both residents and healthcare providers.

THE IMPACT:




