# Physician Recruitment, Wellness and Retention

As a large division with a diverse, growing patient population, Surrey-North Delta's recruitment and retention initiatives play a crucial role in supporting the community of family physicians and its patients. This year, recruitment and retention efforts focused on hosting various networking events, including a new physician network event to build connections between FPs who are new to practice and/or to the Surrey area; a picnic for members and their families, a casino-themed winter party for members and their spouses and a Christmas brunch among others.

The division also honoured retiring physicians at its AGM and sent two members to the Family Medicine Forum in Toronto. They spread the word about living and working in Surrey-North Delta and about vacancies in the community.

# **Physician Engagement and Practice Support**

A core mandate of the Divisions of Family Practice is physician engagement, and the Surrey-North Delta Division works tirelessly on that front.

The Physician Engagement and Support (PES) team in Surrey-North Delta endeavors to build long-lasting, trusting relationships with all community FPs, and to be a resource that FPs can consult in times of need.

During the 2018–2019 year, the division has seen FP members increase their participation in events and many new-to-practice FPs join the division's working groups and committees.

In the context of primary care network development in Surrey-North Delta, the division is currently working in collaboration with community organizations, the Practice Support Program (PSP), Health Match BC, health authorities, GPSC and the Ministry of Health to develop a well-coordinated and refined physician engagement strategy that is responsive to physician needs.

# PMH & PCN NEIGHBOURHOOD NETWORKS

Through PCNs, more allied health resources can be added to FP practices and the division aims to ensure its FPs are prepared to incorporate those resources into their practices.

The PCN initiative will also bring more FP and Nurse Practitioner (NP) positions to the Surrey-North Delta community. The division is mapping the recruitment needs in its nine LHSA neighbourhoods to identify the areas of highest need.

The nine smaller neighbourhoods are regrouped into three larger neighbourhood networks:

- North Surrey & Guildford
- North Delta & West Newton
- East Newton, Cloverdale, Fleetwood & Panorama

The division is actively developing a neighbourhood network engagement strategy to facilitate FP-to-FP connections and to develop a venue to inform our members about how potential new initiatives under PCN might impact their practices.

We have actively been working in gathering first-hand information from FPs about the primary care needs in their community, and the kind of supports required to address those needs and we see the Neighbourhood Networks as the natural setting to continue these conversations.

#### **MOA NETWORK**

Surrey-North Delta's MOA Network Working Group is formed by a strong, hardworking group of medical office assistants (MOAs). These MOAs take a leadership role in planning and organizing MOA Network events and aligning these activities with the group's mission: to provide resources to MOAs in the Surrey-North Delta community.

The network's vision is to see:

- Strong communication and relationships between the division, FPs, MOAs and community health services
- Opportunities for professional development for MOAs that results in improved career satisfaction, job performance and patient care
- A thriving network where MOAs feel heard, respected and valued
- A venue that enables idea sharing and problem solving

Currently, Surrey-North Delta has 254 MOAs actively participating in the network.

#### RACE

RACE, or Rapid Access to Consultative Expertise, is a mobile app developed in 2014 by the Surrey-North Delta Division.

Beginning in late 2017, and ongoing through 2018, the Surrey-North Delta Division participated in the Connected Medicine Collaborative, to spread the use of, and provision of service on, the Fraser Valley RACE app throughout the Fraser Health Region.

The division collaborated with Fraser Health to receive funding from the Canadian Foundation of Healthcare Improvement (CFHI) in order to achieve these goals.

As a result of these efforts, by December of 2018, Fraser Valley RACE app users had increased from 400 to 700 and the number of specialists providing services on the app had increased from seven to nine.

#### **PATHWAYS**

Over the past year, Pathways has grown both in users and number of specialists. Phase 1 (Launch Improved CS to Physicians) and Phase 2 (Expand User Access) of the Community Services Improvement Plan was completed. Phase 3 (Launch Public-Facing Community Services) is currently underway.


In Surrey-North Delta and other select divisions, Pathways has been preparing to launch its Referral Tracker, an electronic tool that will allow FPs and specialists to collaborate more effectively while providing real-time information to patients. This is an exciting project that aims to simplify the referral process, reduce costs and improve the referral experience for all stakeholders and the division has committed to actively work on its implementation.

# **CORE STRATEGIC IMPERATIVE 3 Strategic Initiatives**

#### RESIDENTIAL CARE INITIATIVE

The Residential Care Initiative (RCI) aims to provide educational opportunities for FPs with patients in residential care, enabling them to update their skills and knowledge in areas that are of relevance to that patient population.

The RCI team is currently partnering with Shared Care and the Directors of Care Group to improve the flow of information between acute care and residential care when a resident or an elderly person from the community visits a hospital.

This project's goals are to:

- Improve the quality of care to elders while they are in hospital
- Reduce length of stay
- Avoid unnecessary treatments and investigations
- Improve elders' care upon their return to residential care or the community

#### **SHARED CARE**

#### **NEUROLOGY PROJECT**

2018–2019 was a busy year for the Neurology Project working group, which aims to improve access, capacity, communication and referrals to neurology to reduce wait-times for consultations. This year, the group held two well-attended education sessions, "Diagnosing and Treatment of Migraines" and "Concussion Management," and piloted a concussion clinic at the Surrey Library.

The group also developed migraine resources and a headache tool, which includes protocols and resources (available to members on Pathways as well as the division website).

#### **MATERNITY CARE FOR REFUGEES PROJECT**

The Maternity Care for Refugees Project was created in 2018 to improve early care for refugee women who are pregnant. Two engagement sessions were held to determine gaps in care and identify strategies for addressing them. These uncovered a need for translation services, patient education and attachment to a provider.

To begin addressing these needs, the group developed maternity resources in English, Arabic and Punjabi, including a video for refugees that explains what they should expect from maternity care.

The group also worked to raise awareness of existing programs for pre- and post-natal education and made a presentation to a refugee moms group organized by DIVERSEcity.

#### **LOCAL ACTION TEAM**

The Surrey-North Delta Local Action Team (LAT) was formed four years ago under the CYMHSU initiative, funded through Shared Care the Committee. This work has continued in our community through support and funding from the Division.

The LAT is a catalyst for change in child and youth mental health, starting and continuing the conversation on ACEs and trauma in the Surrey-North Delta community and amongst FPs whose patients include children and youth.

In 2018-2019, the LAT collaborated with community partners on several initiatives aimed at addressing child and youth mental health and substance use in the community.

#### SURREY/WHITE ROCK INTEGRATED YOUTH COLLABORATIVE

Since November of 2018, the Surrey/White Rock Integrated Youth Collaborative (SWRIYC) has been meeting twice weekly with the aim of integrating youth health services and creating a Foundry in Surrey-North Delta and White Rock. Foundry is a chain of integrated health services' centres for youth aged 12 to 24 that provide access to mental health care, substance use services, primary care, social services and youth and family peer supports.

Because provincial funding for additional Foundries was announced in the last Provincial Budget, the SWRIYC is currently preparing a proposal to submit to Foundry BC when it issues its next call for proposals. More information can be found at foundrybc.ca.

#### PATIENT PORTAL

The Patient Portal is a website and phone line maintained by Surrey-North Delta Division staff that connects patients with FPs. The portal lists family physicians in the Surrey-North Delta region who are currently accepting patients, along with their contact information and other key details such as languages spoken.

#### **OAT FORCE**

Initiated in April 2018, the Opioid Agonist Therapy (OAT) Force is a multidisciplinary, team-based project that exists to combat the devastating impact of fentanyl overdoses by empowering physicians on the front lines of the opioid crisis to administer opioid agonist therapy.

While opioid agonist therapy is a safe and effective treatment, many FPs do not offer it to patients.

The OAT Force identified several barriers to physicians offering OAT, including a lack of trauma awareness, burnout, difficulty adapting to new billing workflows and a sense of isolation stemming from a shortage of meaningful connections amongst FP colleagues.

To combat these challenges, the group partnered with the BC Centre on Substance Use to develop a curriculum in Trauma Informed Practice. They also developed several educational modules, delivered to FPs in Surrey-North Delta, that cover topics including urine drug screen ordering and interpretation, billing for BupNal Tx, OAT FMR workflows and more.

In February 2019, the OAT Force was invited to present at the sold-out Quality Forum where the group shared their learnings with over 80 live audience members and many more via social media.

#### ROOTS COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRE

In March 2018, the Surrey-North Delta Division of Family Practice Refugee Health Working Group formally created an independently registered non-profit called Roots Community Health Centre Society (Roots CHC). The group opened its first site in Surrey in July 2018.

#### WHAT ROOTS DOES:

Roots CHC's mission is to provide person-centred, longitudinal care to vulnerable newcomers through an interdisciplinary, culturally-safe team of family practice clinicians, specialists, allied health, social service professionals, and PMH attachment services.

The clinic provides primary health care to Government Assisted Refugees, privately sponsored refugees, refugee claimants, migrant workers, and other vulnerable newcomers and visitors from around the world regardless of their ability to pay.

Currently, the clinic is seeing an especially high number of people with significant needs displaced by violence in Syria. To date, Roots has provided 2,000 primary care visits for over 750 patients.

#### APPLYING THE PATIENT MEDICAL HOME MODEL

Since opening, Roots CHC's partnerships and engaged executive team have enabled its patients to receive not just primary medical care, but also services from allied health professionals working with patients within the same space. The clinic is continuing to expand its on-site interdisciplinary services.
