

2021 Annual 2022 Report



Highlights of the Year

- 2021 2022 was almost apocalyptic with Covid-19, wildfires, anti-vaxers and floods demanding our attention and adding strain to medical providers, resources and leadership. And yet, like troopers, you rallied yet again, dug deep and found the resilience needed to do what you do best take care of your patients and community! For this we applaud you and thank you!
- Collaboration with Interior Health, Okanagan Indian Band, Splatsin First Nations, Community Partners and the Ministry of Health. In 2021 2022 we embarked on over 40 engagement sessions with key First Nations, community, and Physician partners in the development of the SNO Collaborative Services Committee's (CSC) Primary Care Network (PCN) Service Plan. The Service Plan was submitted to the Ministry in 2022. We anticipate a funding announcement in the Fall of 2022.
- We continue to support Physician and Nurse Practitioner wellness through various courses:
 - 8 week Managing Distractions for Increased Productivity and Wellness with Dr. Paul Mohapel:

There were a total of 42 participants (27 Family Physicians, 14 Hospital-based physicians and 1 Nurse Practitioner).registered with this course. Feedback included:

Covid-19 community support

- Family Physicians were instrumental in providing support to the Covid-19 Mass Immunization Clinics. Thank you to all the physicians who supported the immunization clinics and thank you Peggy Crough for keeping the schedule organised!
- Interior Health had the lowest uptake in the Covid-19 vaccine among health care workers which resulted in crippling staff shortages in acute care and long-term care facilities. SNO hosted Covid-19 Vaccine Hesitancy Q and A sessions to help to try to dispel the fear and misinformation surrounding the vaccines. Thank you, Drs. Debbie Phillips, JP Viljoen, Alison Howatt and Liz Montgomery, for your time, patience, and knowledge.
- A working group was formed to develop a sustainable model for Shuswap Lake Hospital Doctor of the Day program. This working group was well positioned to submit a Memorandum of Understanding to the GPSC for Bridge Funding to support in-patient care in small to medium sized hospitals. Thank you, Drs. Alison Howatt, Alex Enns, Juliann Aitchison, Laura Hepburn, Rob McKeough, Cody Thomson, Michael Abayomi, Kim Grieve, David Shoesmith, and Brook Glanville.
- Integrated Care Teams and team-based rounds were successfully rolled out to the family physicians in Sterling Centre, Haugen Medical Clinic and Enderby Health Unit.

Highlights of the Year Continued

- We celebrated the return to in-person meetings with a highly successful Evening with General Surgery, that saw 61 family physicians, NPs, students and residents in attendance as well as 9 physicians on the not so successful Zoom call!



In Memoriam Dr. Michael Mbuye Mthandazo

He went on to further his studies at the University of Botswana and continued to medical school at the University of Cape Town where he graduated as a medical doctor in 2007.
