HIGHLIGHTS OF THE

Supporting our Physicians in Practice

- Supported 33 Active Initiatives.
- Held educational events on various topics including billing practices, medical marijuana, medical assistance in dying (MAID), pain, physician wellnesss, quality improvement and specialty medicine.
- Provided recruitment services to assist members with retirement, clinic relief, and growth strategies.
 Seven new GPs joined our community this year.
- Continued financially supporting local clinics to hire nurses in practice and enhance team-based care
- Enhanced communication between GPs and hospitalists through the Transitions in Care project.
- Supported 17 GPs who provided in-hospital care for their patients.
- Advocated for our physician members by participating in local, regional and provincial committees, including several collaborative committees with Fraser Health.



Investing in the Health of our Community

- Successfully advocated for Opioid Agonist
 Treatment (OAT) services in WRSS. The OAT Working
 Group identified an ideal model for OAT services and obtained approval to open a WRSS clinic in fall 2018.
- Continued participation in the South Surrey White Rock five-year Move 4 Life initiative, which strives to improve the health of our community through physical activity and literacy.
- Provided public education on the health effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). Currently, ACEs screening is being used by a local family practice clinic and the Peace Arch Maternity Clinic.
- Co-hosted the Balancing our Minds Youth Summit to raise awareness and share resources on mental health as part of the Child and Youth Mental Health (CYMH) and Substance Use Initiative. The Summit was attended by 580 students from the Surrey School District.
- The Triage Consulting Team offered consultations to school representatives to develop action plans for 28 at-risk students. The team consists of a child psychiatrist, family physician, social worker, CYMH clinician, district resource counsellor and triage team coordinator.
- Relocated the Primary Care Access Clinic to ensure that hard-to-attach patients can continue to have their care needs met by the clinic's interdisciplinary team.

Championing Patient-Centred Care

- Engaged our community GPs to inform the Division's Patient Medical Home (PMH) strategy.
- Supported 13 physicians who provided enhanced, 24/7 care to over 1250 residential care patients.
- Engaged 38 GPs, 21 Specialists and 21 clinic managers to improve the referral process in WRSS by identifying and developing a patientcentred, coordinated and efficient solution.
- Supported physician access to the Provincial Health Services Authority Telephone Interpretation Services to help meet the diverse language needs of patients in the community.
- Worked with the Acute Care for Elders (ACE) unit in Peace Arch Hospital to improve the process of conducting meaningful medication reviews to reduce patient risk of polypharmacy following hospital discharge.
- Collaborated with the Community Actions & Resources Empowering Seniors (CARES) project team to support physicians with early assessment of seniors to delay frailty using the Comprehensive Geriatric Assessment (CGA).

Supporting the Optimization & Use of Information Technology

- Represented the needs of Division members on a collaborative committee focused on finding solutions for information technology access and collaborative care planning.
- The GP/SP Referral Process project obtained funding to partner with Pathways BC to develop an electronic referral and patient notification system to be implemented in the fall of 2018.
- Partnered with the Practice Support Program (PSP) to support members with understanding and assessing their patient panels and optimizing their use of EMRs.
- Continued to administer Pathways for specialist referrals, FETCH for community resources, and promoted Medimap for clinic wait-times.

Our Child and Youth Mental Health and Substance Use Collaborative sparked a passion in WRSS with the introduction of the Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) landmark study inspiring over 100 individuals to want to create a more resilient community. Future development of this initiative will be guided by the voices of our community.

All of these initiatives required thoughtful ears and paying attention to what is important to our members. I have had the pleasure of being part of many of the discussions and listening to you firsthand. I am left with an overwhelming sense of excitement of what the next year will bring. Although there will be "no shortcuts," I know where we are heading is "a place worth going."
